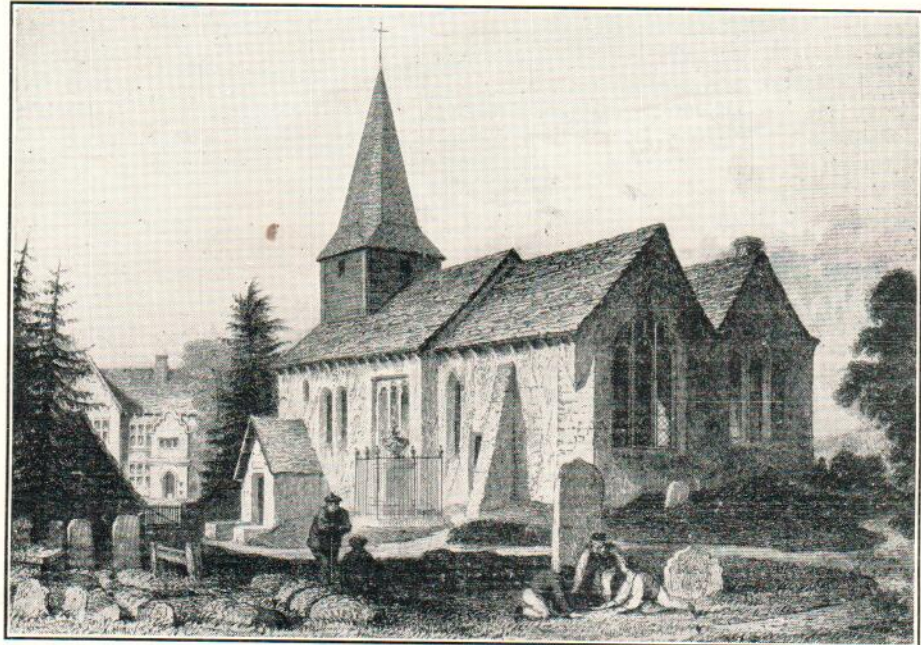

Deep sorrow for the death on active service of Flying Officer Herbert Colin Carpenter, R.A.F. Army Co-operation, of Abinger Common, will be shared by all his relatives and many friends. His father was killed in France in September, 1918. At the outbreak of war he served as an officer in the 5th Battalion the Queen's Royal Regiment (West Surrey), and took part in the defence of Belgium. He was severely injured by blast, and brought to Dunkirk, where for fourteen hours he endured with hundreds of other men the furious German bombardment. As a result of this his nervous system was severely affected, and he was offered his release, although he had rejoined his regiment in October, 1940. But his terrible experiences had produced in him a great desire—to take part in air battles and to conquer his fear of air attack. So intense was this desire that he mastered his nerves, and was accepted as a pilot in the R.A.F. in January, 1941. He gained his wings in October, 1941. He never looked back, and became an able and courageous pilot.

Abinger and Wotton Nursing Association.

Abinger and Wotton Nursing Association has printed and issued their Thirty-fourth Annual Statement of Accounts, but in order to save printing the Report, which is type-written, is again available on application to the Hon. Secretary.

The arrangement with Holmbury St. Mary under which that district is served by the Nurse of A.W.N.A. continues, to the mutual benefit of both Associations, and the work in the three parishes of Abinger, Wotton, and Holmbury St. Mary is still carried on by Nurse Heather, whose address is The Laurels, Abinger Hammer (Telephone, Abinger 17).

The friendly relations with Shere Nursing Association continue, and mutual help is given in times of need and pressure of work.

After inspection of Nurse's work by the Q.I. an excellent report was received.

Mrs. Clow and Mrs. Cundall are welcomed as new members of the Executive Committee in place of Lady Farrer and Mrs. Nicholson, whose resignations owing to illness were much regretted.

Renewed thanks are due to Major Lugard for acting as Auditor; to the Hon. Collectors (Mrs. Atkinson, Mrs. Clow, Mrs. Hicks, Mrs. Meade, and Mrs. Stephens) for their invaluable assistance in collecting the membership fees; and to subscribers and donors for their support.

Owing to the Surrey County Council's generous grant the Association is able to carry forward a balance of £24 5s. 8d. after placing £40 to Motor Car Replacement Fund.

The 1941 Annual Meeting was held at Abinger Hall on June 26th, by invitation of the Dowager Lady Farrer. There was a small attendance. Formal business only was before the meeting. Owing to war-time exigencies in common with other societies it has been decided to suspend the Annual Meeting this

year. The Committee regret that the number of Benefit Members has fallen in recent years, and it is thought that membership of the Hospital League is in some measure accountable for this. It is hoped that each member of the Nursing Association who values his or her membership will bring the advantages of the Association to the notice of their friends and to any newcomers to the district. Without the foundation of a good steady membership the Association could not be carried on, and the great benefit of the presence of a skilled nurse ready to care for the sick in their homes, to succour in any emergency, and to look after cases of chronic illness would be lost to this rural neighbourhood.
